

Another step up the ladder to national success is one of the goals of the 1995 Maryland women's soccer team. The Terps gained national ranking for the second consecutive season last year, and have even higher aspirations in this season. Among those goals are being in contention for a berth on the NCAA Tournament, establishing itself as one of the top teams in the Atlantic Coast Conference, and earning a regular spot among the nation's elite teams.

The 1995 Terps have three key components needed to return the Terps to the national rankings for the third consecutive season.

- 1) The defense, led by an All-ACC performer, is solid;
- 2) The midfield, with three starters returning, could be one of the strongest in the ACC;
- **3)** The frontline, with the program's third all-time leading scorer, is aggressive and tested.

THE DEFENSE

Maryland's defense, which allowed less than two goals a game last season, returns two of its more consistent players and welcomes six exciting newcomers which should produce one of the stingiest defenses in its history.

Junior goalkeeper Missy Price was consistent during her first season as the Terps' full-time starter, and was rated among the top goalkeepers in the ACC during the entire season. Her 1.95 career goals against average is the best in program history, while her 106 saves last season ranks as the second best single season effort in the Terp record books. Freshman Kassie Knecht, who ranks as the all-time national high school leader in career shutouts with 72, will compete for the starting position immediately upon her arrival. Knecht is considered to be one of the nation's top recruits entering the college ranks this fall and was a first team All-America selection as a senior. She recorded 20 shutouts and an incredible 0.22 goals against average her senior season.

Senior sweeper Erin Taylor returns as one of Maryland's biggest assets. A second team All-ACC performer last season, Taylor returns as one of the top defenders in the conference. Taylor has the ability to be physical and skillful at the same time, making her a tough player to encounter when attacking the Terps' goal. In addition, she is a talented offensive player as her nine career goals would attest.

Freshman Tiffany Keyes and junior Ginette Chelius will also compete for playing time at the always important sweeper position. Keyes is one of Maryland's blue-chip recruits who will contribute immediately. She played with the U.S. U-17 national team and was invited to tryout for the U-17 All-American team this past summer. In addition to adding depth at sweeper, Keyes could make noise as a starter at one of the marking back positions. Chelius, a two-time letterwinner, possesses great speed and is one of the taller Terps.

Maryland's marking backs will take on a decidedly new look as only one letterwinner, junior Maureen McDonough, returns to the position. McDonough has been a real team player during her first two seasons, playing virtually everywhere on the field whenever asked. She started all 20 games last season

and has played in 38 of 40 in the last two years. She will once again provide a defensive spark from the left back position.

Newcomers Laura Venanzie, Katie Varela, Sara Warlick and the aforementioned Keyes are major components of the Terps' strongest ever recruiting class. They will have an immediate impact. Varela, a starter on the West Region ODP team in 1993 could very well earn a starting berth along with Keyes. Both players have enjoyed success on the national level and will bring a great deal of experience to the already strong Terps defense. Venanzie is a local product who attended Towson High School and earned first-team All-Baltimore County honors. Warlick, another local player from Chevy Chase, Md., was the Washington area Player of the Year in 1993. Venanzie and Warlick will add much needed depth to the position.

THE MIDFIELD

The strength of this season's team will be the depth and leadership exhibited by the extremely talented midfield. With three starters returning at the position, the Terps' midfield is considered to be one of the top groups in the ACC. Senior Terri Rich and sophomore Michelle Salmon are the top returning scorers from last year and Taliaferro was an All-ACC tournament selection as the Terps advanced to the Tournament semifinals.

Rich, a strong athlete, has continued to improve during each of her first three years and is looking to emerge as one of Maryland's top players in this, her senior season. She is currently ranked fifth on Maryland's all-time goal scoring list and fifth in total points with 28.

Salmon stepped up as one of the

top freshmen in the league last season. She started 18 games and scored four goals to rank among the team leaders in that category. Her skill increased with added confidence, and she was playing her best soccer late in the season. She will be called upon to assist with the scoring load, especially with the loss of three of Maryland's top scorers from the 1994 season.

Taliaferro is one of four seniors who will have to provide leadership, both as a team captain and as a distributor in order for the Terps to be successful. She is an outstanding ballhandler who possesses one of the hardest shots in the ACC. Taliaferro is a strong finisher in the offensive end who also excels as an open field defender.

A trio of highly recruited newcomers, Shannon Jones, Robin McCullough and Abby Bausman will be joined by senior Julie Bortz as valuable contributors in the midfield.

Jones, McCullough and Bausman are all gifted players who have

enormous amounts of high level high school and ODP experience. Jones was a four-year varsity starter and a two-time all-District performer, McCullough was a starter on the Georgia U-17 ODP team for three years and Bausman is a member of the Maryland ODP program and a member of the regional U-17 team. All will contribute with valuable minutes early, and will develop into starters early in their Maryland careers. Bortz, who returns to the Terps after a foot injury last season, will add to the depth at the position and be a team leader.

THE FRONT LINE

Senior Michelle Demko takes over at center forward, and will be flanked by two players from a group which includes junior Kelly Amonte, sophomores Michelle DeVille and Keri Sarver, and freshman Emmy Harbo. Amonte is the program's No. 3 all-time scorer and DeVille showed flashes of brilliance as a freshman in 1994. Harbo, a speedster, has the

potential to be one of the top forwards in the ACC during her career.

The Terps' offense will benefit tremendously from the return of Demko and Sarver, who both missed the 1994 season. Demko has been characterized as one of the most gifted and skilled players in Division I. She brings an air of unpredictability to the offense. She scored four goals and added four assists during her first year at Maryland in 1993. Sarver, who missed her entire freshman campaign with a knee injury, brings a flair for the game and an exceedingly hard shot from the right side.

DeVille is another exciting offensive player who is outstanding with the ball at her feet. She is a rising star in the ACC who will be 100 percent healthy to begin the season. DeVille can play either midfield or forward. She was at her best late last season after recovering from off-season knee surgery. She

played in the final 16 games of the season and scored three goals. Amonte, possibly the best athlete on the team, will be a valuable contributor as one of the fastest players in the ACC. The 1992 All-American is outstanding in the open field and tough to catch when she gets a step on any defender. Harbo is a national pool player for the U-19 National Team and is considered to be one of the nation's top young players. Her impact will be immediate and she will be counted on to provide scoring throughout her career.

The Terps could send the most talented players in the history of the program onto the field on a regular basis in 1995. The key for Heinrichs and her coaching staff is to find the correct ingredients, blend them quickly, and attack the most rugged schedule she has ever assembled.

April Heinrichs Head Coach

As April Heinrichs begins her fifth season as Maryland's head coach, she has established herself as one of the top collegiate coaches in the nation. Not only is Heinrichs the architect of the nation's most attractive young program, but she has built herself a solid foundation which will help her lead the flourishing program well into the coming century.

Since being named the first full-time head coach in the history of the program in 1991, Maryland has won nearly 60 percent of its games and has been nationally ranked each of the past two years. She has led the program into new territory and into the national top-10 for the first time in 1995 as the Terps begin the season ranked No. 9 in the *College Sports Magazine* pre-season poll.

In addition to her head coaching duties at Maryland, Heinrichs is a full-time assistant coach to the U.S. Women's National Team. She assumed her duties with the National Team in January of

1995 and helped coach the U.S. to a bronze medal finish at the World Championships in Sweden.

Heinrichs was a captain of the 1991 world-champion U.S. team and, along with Michelle Akers and Carin Gabarra, was one third of the trio dubbed "the triple edged sword" during the world championship run in China. That threesome scored 20 of the 25 U.S. goals as the team won the sport's highest honor. In five games during the 1991 World Cup, Heinrichs scored five goals, including two versus Brazil.

She closed her playing career with 38 goals in 47 international games. She won the U.S. Soccer Female Athlete of the Year award twice, in 1986 and 1989.

She played four years of collegiate soccer at the University of North Carolina, earning first team All-America honors three times. The Tar Heels captured three national championships during her tenure and finished as the national runner up in 1985. She was named the Most Valuable Player of the NCAA Tournament in 1984, 1985 and 1986. Heinrichs completed her career at North Carolina as the all-time NCAA leader in total points with 225 (87 goals and 51 assists). Only twotime national Player of the Year Mia Hamm has since eclipsed Heinrich's Division I scoring record. North Carolina registered an incredible 85-3-2 record during her playing career in Chapel Hill. The dangerous striker was named the Player

of the Decade for the 1980s by *Soccer America* Magazine.

Heinrichs, a native of Littleton, Colo., earned her bachelor's degree in radio/television/motion pictures from North Carolina in 1986. She began her collegiate coaching career as an assistant coach at William and Mary in 1987 and in 1990 was the head coach at Princeton University.

She is an active clinician, lecturer, and is an instructor for U.S. Soccer and its coaching schools.



Jillian Ellis Assistant Coach

Jillian Ellis begins her second season as an assistant coach. She was named as a full-time assistant coach in May after serving the program since September of 1994 on a part-time basis.


As the chief assistant to fifth year Head Coach April Heinrichs, Ellis will be involved in all phases of the program. Her duties will include all on and off campus recruiting of prospective student-athletes, technical

and tactical training, budget appropriation, opponent scouting and general program administration.

Ellis, a 1988 graduate of the College of William & Mary, served as the assistant coach for women's soccer at N.C. State from 1988-91. While there, she helped coach the Wolfpack to the 1988 NCAA Finals and to the 1988 Atlantic Coast Conference Championship. In addition, she is a staff coach for the Maryland and Virginia Olympic Development programs and holds a "B" License from the United States Soccer Federation.

Ellis was a third team

and a member of the ISAA
Senior Recognition Team in
1987. Ellis is a member of
the region I coaching staff
and is an employee of the
Soccer Academy, Inc.

She earned her bachelor's degree in English Language and Literature from William and Mary in 1988. She is working towards a master's degree in technical communication from N.C. State.





Q & A with April Heinrichs

What gives you so much energy?

My energy is derived from a passion for the game. Soccer excites me to watch, to participate and to coach the game. I am energetic, enthusiastic and always having fun when I am around the game of soccer. Soccer is the greatest game in the world to me.

What is your coaching philosophy?

I think my coaching philosophy comes from having played the game of soccer. We learn certain qualities from playing the game that are important. We find that there is a certain level of commitment and dedication that is necessary to prepare yourself to be a great player. There is an honesty, a passion and a desire that only you can have within yourself. We learn these things as a player and I have also learned them as a coach. My coaching philosophy has always been:

- 1: To make sure that we are working hard. As long as we are working hard we have a tenacity and a fury about us that will never allow us to give up on ourselves or each other.
- 2: This is a team sport and we have to work together. Playing with each other is deeply seeded in our care, concern and friendship for each other. Our relationships off the field bring us closer so that when we compete on the field we have a greater commitment to each other to strive, to achieve and attain our goals.

What has helped you shape your coaching philosophy?

I really believe that athletics and life are analogous. My philosophy comes from the understanding that when I was out on the field that my teammates were always there



for me. If I made a mistake. there was always someone there to cover for me. In return, I would do the same for them. I also strongly believe that the learning process must be constant. Learning is the primary reason that we are on the college campus — to learn the books, to learn life and to learn soccer. In my coaching philosophy, I have tried to instill that. Are we learning along the way? On the field, we can not sacrifice learning the fundamentals of the game of soccer at the cost of a winning comes first attitude. We combine hard work and encouragement in each other in every aspect of our lives. We step back to insure that we are learning with each

stride that we take. Also, at the end of each day, we must be able to say that we had fun.

What is the most significant aspect of the North Carolina Tradition that you still carry with you?

I still carry the inspiration that anything worth attaining has a price. If you want to be a good student, and you set that as one of your goals and establish a plan on how to accomplish it, then there are going to be some sacrifices that you have to make. You are going to have to make that commitment and at times, you will have to roll up your sleeves and really dig in. Everything that you want has a price. Anything

worth having, anything worth attaining, anything worth setting a goal for or working towards, has a price. Are you willing to prepare yourself to make the needed sacrifices; to put in the hours; to achieve what you really want?

What excites you about the game of soccer?

Soccer is developing very quickly and the younger players are getting better and better each day. The opportunity to work with some of these quality players has heightened my enthusiasm for coaching the next generation. It is great to see how much the game of soccer has developed during its relatively short life span.

What is the key to attracting top student-athletes to attend the University of Maryland?

Almost all of the top soccer programs look the same on the surface. As a prospective student-athlete follows the recruiting process at Maryland they will learn that what they see is what they get. They will quickly learn that Maryland is a quality academic choice. When they decide to come to Maryland, they will know that Jill and I will be here for them every day as a person in their lives who will look after them, help them increase their selfesteem and help them attain their goals. They will know that we are people that they can count on to always be there for them. They will know when they come to Maryland that they can count on a team being tight knit, considerate and supportive. They will know they are joining an ambitious group of players. A recruit will know we are what we say we are. The parents of a recruit can be assured that Maryland is going to be a positive experience.



Q & A with April Heinrichs



What type of studentathlete do you look for when you are recruiting?

One of life's most important qualities is ambition. Ambitious people who have a strong balance between their athletic and academic goals are the kind of people that I like to attract to Maryland. I want to surround our program with quality people. Whether we win or lose at Maryland, we can always be happier if we are surrounded by quality people. Their personal characteristics are very important. I am looking for people who have ambitions beyond soccer. That person

has to be ambitious for herself and her team. Goals and goal setting are also very important. I enjoy helping them set goals but I also want to attract studentathletes who are ambitious on their own as people, students and players. If somebody has all of these qualities, and I like the way they play, they become somebody that I identify as a potential student-athlete for the University of Maryland.

What work must go into developing a top caliber team?

My philosophy has always been to learn, have fun, work hard and come together as a team and play for each other. At the end of a day you must feel good about what you have accomplished. Winning certainly feels good, but it is not the most important aspect of my job here at Maryland. When a player comes to me with a dilemma, knowing she trusts me to advise her is a great feeling. To me, that is as good as any win.

As a head coach, how do you get a team to develop a winning chemistry?

Developing a winning chemistry and a winning attitude takes time. As a team, we talk about goal setting, about setting standards and about the expectations that we have of each other. We talk about what we want as people and players. We talk about how we want to represent the University of Maryland. Many times, talking becomes goal setting. That leads in to establishing plans. Everybody injects ideas about how we can do something differently or better. You have

to practice winning like you practice scoring goals. We talk about kindness towards each other so that we can develop a positive feeling towards each other as people and teammates. This type of overall attitude will contribute to our success on the field.

What is your biggest moment in soccer?

Clearly winning the World Championship. I do not think I can single out any one moment during the tournament that was greater than any other. Nothing stands above the fact, that we, as a team of 19, won the World Championship.

What do you do to relax and get away?

I really consider myself to be one of the luckiest people that I know. I have been very fortunate throughout my life to have many friends. I love biking, rollerblading, reading and spending quality time with friends. Being in soccer is a great, wonderful career. I can honestly say that I have a nice balance between my personal and my professional life.







James H. Kehoe Track and Field Facility/Ludwig Soccer Complex

Because of the expanding horizon of Terrapin soccer and the growing interest in its achievements on the field, the most extensive facility enhancement in Maryland soccer history was undertaken. The result: The state of the art Ludwig Soccer Field.

The James H. Kehoe Track and Field Facility/Ludwig Soccer Field is the new permanent home of the Terps. Built at a cost of \$2.5 million, the facility's quality matches the Maryland student-athletes who will compete there. The soccer facility, which will be officially dedicated on September 16, 1995, will surely be a cornerstone of college soccer throughout the nation.

The 1,500 seat facility is an integral part of the more than \$40 million of new construction for Maryland athletics. The rejuvenation of the athletic facilities is an important goal of the University President, Board of Regents, Athletic Council and Department of Intercollegiate Athletics.

The complex is fully lighted with an all-weather track and a newly sodded Bermuda grass playing field.

The permanent lights will allow for commonly scheduled night games, something new to the Terrapins. The women will play six night games this season, with many more planned for the future. The lights also will allow Maryland the ability to host NCAA and Atlantic Coast Conference tournaments, high caliber in-season tournaments and nationally televised games.

The primary seating section is on the west side of the complex, directly behind the team benches. The project was

developed with the overall aesthetics of the west fields in mind. In the near future, a \$100 million Theater Arts Center will be built to the immediate north of the complex. Construction on the center will conclude by the end of the century.

The flawless Bermuda grass playing field gives Maryland one of the top playing surfaces, not only in the Atlantic Coast Conference but in the nation. The playing surface will be completely operational to begin the 1995 season.

The complex was also constructed with the visiting fan very much in mind. The field is located directly adjacent to Parking Lot 1 (the largest on the College Park Campus) and close to the University Boulevard entrance. Student and visitor traffic will flow easily towards the facility. Construction of rest rooms at the south end of the stadium complete the stadium amenities.

The facility is named for James H. Kehoe, former University Athletic Director and highly successful track and field coach, and lifetime Terrapin friends Bob and Louise Ludwig.

The soccer hotbeds that surround the University of Maryland provide an educated fan base which will no doubt enjoy the competition at the newly constructed facility. The best players, the best teams and the best rivalries deserve the best facility - Terrapin soccer can now boast all of these ingredients.

The University of Maryland at College Park



Picture a university so comprehensive that if offers degrees in 98 disciplines, so technologically advanced that it manages specially designed research facilities not found on any other campus in the country, and boasts a telecommunications system which serves as a model for universities worldwide. And, at the same time, it is a university concerned enough to include special housing matched to

student interests, and to ensure that half of all undergraduate classes have fewer than 30 students.

That's a snapshot of the University of Maryland at College Park, the flagship institution of Maryland's system of higher education.

Academic Stature

One of only 30 public research universities in the prestigious 58-member Association of American Universities; among fewer than 10 percent of universities invited to join Phi Beta Kappa.

Baccalaureate Choices: Degrees offered in 98 disciplines; preprofessional programs in dental hygiene, dentistry, law, medical technology, medicine, nursing, optometry, osteopathic medicine, pharmacy, physical therapy and pediatric medicine.

Dramatic Moments: Find them in the 1,350 seat Tawes Theater, the stage for major theatrical productions and special events. **Faculty Facts:** Full-time, 1,998; part-time 544; student/faculty ratio, 14/1.

Getting There: The MARC train offers public transportation from College Park to Baltimore's Camden Station, next to Orioles Park at Camden Yards and near the Inner Harbor. The highly efficient Metro system puts the Suburban Maryland, District of Columbia and Northern Virginia areas a rapid transit system ride away from College Park.

Ideas: More than 100 active patent disclosures by university inventors are managed by the Office of Technology Liaison.

Journalist's Pick: The College of Journalism was selected as one of two sites in the U.S. for the Hubert H. Humphrey Fellowship Program, and named one of the nation's top communications programs by the Gannett Center for Media Studies.

Library Holdings: Largest academic research library system in Washington metropolitan area. There are 2.8 million volumes in libraries and 4.6 million items on microfilm.

Nationally Noted: A dozen academic departments and programs at College Park are placed in the top 10 among U.S. public universities by the National Academy of Sciences.

Neighbors: Campus neighbors include the Library of Congress, the Smithsonian Institutions, the National Institutes of Health, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), the National Science Foundation and the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Research Center. On campus is National Archives II.

On the Drawing Board: \$36 million campus recreation center and \$100 million Center for Performing Arts will soon enhance the campus.

U.S. News and World Report Finds: The Department of Computer Science ranks 12th in the nation, beating three Ivy League schools, and the Department of Physics is 13th best, ahead of UCLA and Pennsylvania among others. The College of Business and Management is considered 14th in student selectivity.

Value Added: College Park is included in the *Guide to 101 of the Best Values in Colleges and Universities*, published annually by the Center for College Enrollment Studies.

Just after the American Revolution, the state of Maryland established its first two colleges at Chestertown and Annapolis. By the 1850s, at least 30 little colleges had sprung-up over the state, many with state support, but many of them disappearing within a few years. Then, in 1859, a different kind of institution appeared at College Park—the Maryland Agricultural College the third such college in the world, created mainly for farmers' sons. The college was established by Charles Benedict Calvert, a wealthy planter from nearby Riversdale—now Riverdale—and later a congressman. Calvert built a handsome Gothic dormitory-classroom structure located in a grove of trees near the present Morrill Hall and he divided the land down the Baltimore-Washington Turnpike into small plots where each of the 50-or-so students experimented with a different crop. After the Civil War, the institution became a land-grant college with small appropriations from Washington. The little college began to grow about 1900 when agricultural experiments began to bring prosperity to Maryland and when the college expanded its offerings into engineering, business and the liberal arts. In 1912, the old Gothic building burned and the state provided modern structures. Women were admitted to the campus, and graduate work began. In 1920, the college combined with the long established professional schools of Baltimore and changed its name to the University of Maryland. Growth accelerated after 1935, when the politically astute football coach, H.C. "Curley" Byrd, became president, added scores of new programs and won national football championships. In the 1950s and 1960s, President Wilson H. Elkins maintained the rapid growth and College Park became one of the largest campuses in the nation. President Elkins, a Rhodes Scholar, transformed the institution's public image to one of high academic integrity. In the 1970s and 1980s, the University's graduate and research programs flourished. In 1988, the General Assembly of Maryland combined six state colleges with the five campuses of the University of Maryland and specifically charged College Park with the role of leadership in the revamped system.
